



We find ourselves in the midst of winter. The days are shorter, and the sunlight is often blocked by clouds. We tend to stay inside, and we may feel as though we should hibernate till the spring.

How do we brighten these winter days?

An answer may arise from the following story:

Long before the Chassidim wore big fedoras, they would wear a cap called a Kashket. It was small, puffy hat, with a little brim.

Once upon a time, the Russian authorities made a decree: All the Kashkets would need an extended brim. To most people, this kind of decree would have seemed like business as usual in Russia, where decrees seemed to be issued at random. But for the Chassidim, this decree presented a theological challenge.

Isaiah 40:26 invites us: "Lift your eyes to the heavens, and take note of the One who created these wonders."

Taking this verse to heart, the Chassidim would raise their eyes and observe the wonders above: the sun and the moon, the stars and the constellations. The sight of these marvels would spark the Chassid's heart so it would burn with fervor for the Holy One.

But now, there was this horrid decree. The extended brim would surely block their eyes from seeing God's wonders. To the Chassidim, it seemed that the Russian authorities were striving to block out the light of God. What would the Chassidim do?

In the end, they came up with a wonderful solution. They agreed to follow the decree, and they donned the Kashkets with the extended brims, just as the authorities had requested. There was just one catch: The Chassidim would now wear their caps backwards. This way, they would be able to see the heavenly sights even better than before.

It behooves us to learn from the Chassidim of old. While we may not be asked to wear Kashkets with extended brims, we may feel that the darkness of winter inhibits our basking in the life-giving rays of the Divine. What we must strive to do is to symbolically flip our hats so that we are open once more.

For some of us this may entail actively embracing winter, like going skiing or making snow-people. For others, it may involve an extra effort to be social, like joining in the many wonderful activities offered at OZS. For a few, it may mean livening up their activities at home, like making cookies and hot chocolate.

This winter, may all of us find ways to flip our hats around so that we may see the glory of God that surrounds us.

I rarely have written about individuals for the OZS bulletin but this month it feels right to acknowledge a transition for one of the synagogue's long time members. Sylvia Green is moving this week from Winchester, KY to Chattanooga, TN, to be near her daughter Sandy. This move is one of many that Sylvia has made in her life – from Karlsruhe, Germany, to Krakow, Poland, to the concentration camps of Plaszow and Auschwitz and Bergen Belsen. After liberation on April 14, 1945, she stayed briefly in Munich and then together with her Aunt Mina Urbach and brother Bernard Farber settled in Lexington, KY where they had extended family. In Lexington, Sylvia attended Henry Clay High School to learn English, audited early morning classes at UK and worked at Wolf Wile Department Store. Upon marrying Jake Green, Sylvia moved with him to Winchester where the Greens had a store. And now to Chattanooga.

Sylvia does not speak often of the horrors of her childhood in Nazi Europe. In oral history interviews she taped for the Kentucky Historical Society, Sylvia explained that she survived the ghetto, forced labor and camps in part because it wasn't yet her time to leave. She later came to believe that this uncompleted life purpose was to raise her own children.

“So I was pretty lucky to have a wonderful husband and the children are great, they really are... I did not want to raise them full of hatred. In fact, they didn't know much about the Holocaust till I made that documentary [in 1983 for KET]. I want to raise them healthy, happy and, physically and mentally... Because I did set myself a goal that if I fail, then Hitler had won out, and he didn't because they're loving children, they really are big hearts.”

I can speak of her own loving heart from having watched her with our children. Sylvia and Jake always had a smile and hug for the children on Shabbat mornings (“Do you remember me? I'm Mr. Blue.” “No you're not.” “Oh, I'm Mr. Yellow.” “No, you're Mr. Green!”). She has wrapped our OZS children in warmth and generosity.

Sylvia, we know that Chattanooga has been a second home for you for some time but please remember that we await eagerly your return visits to Lexington, your first American home.
