This year's elections are upon us. We have experienced another season of campaigning, filled with accusations and denigrations throughout the country.

Judaism asks us to curb our inclination to speak poorly of others, even if what we would say is true. Communicating true, but disparaging information about another is called *Lashon Hara*.

Occasionally, additional propaganda is added to the truth in order to scare people and change opinions. Judaism calls this practice *Motzi Shem Ra* and prohibits it. Sadly, both *Lashon Hara* and *Motzi Shem Ra* occur frequently in our time.

These inappropriate practices are lamentable, but they are not new to our world. The Torah tells us that when our ancestors were freed from Egypt and stood poised to enter the Promised Land, a group of Hebrew spies was sent forth to investigate the land. When the spies returned, they not only described the land, but also added frightening words of their own: "The country that we traversed and scouted is one that devours its settlers." (Num. 13:31, Etz Hayim)

It is upsetting that the spies spread such *Lashon Hara* about the Promised Land. They did not need to broadcast this message of fear to the people.

However, what is even worse is that our ancestors chose to listen and believe this message of fear. Because they heeded the words of the spies, our ancestors frantically reacted, "If only we had died in the land of Egypt, or if only we might die in this wilderness! Why is the Lord taking us to that land to fall by the sword? Our wives and children will be carried off! It would be better for us to go back to Egypt!" (Num. 14:2-4, Etz Hayim)

One of the many lessons we may learn from this event is that *Lashon Hara* is an effective motivator. The spies used it successfully to motivate the people against the will of God and Moshe, and some politicians use it today to influence our political choices. If *Lashon Hara* didn't work, neither the spies of our past, nor the politicians of our present would use it.

While it would be wonderful if politicians adopted the practice of refraining from *Lashon Hara*, given its efficacy, this is unlikely to occur. Rather, it is we who must decide how to respond to the messages we hear.

Ignoring the messages entirely might be a mistake for within the messages may lay kernels of truth that we need to hear. Even amongst the exaggerations and lies of the spies, vital information can be found: "The people who inhabit the country are powerful, and the cities are fortified and very large; moreover, we saw the Anakites there. Amalekites dwell in the Negeb region; Hitites, Jebusites, and Amorites inhabit the hill country; and Canaanites dwell by the Sea and along the Jordan." (Num. 13:28-29, Etz Hayim) This was crucial information that needed to be acknowledged.

Rather than getting swept up in the lies of the spies, our ancestors could have focused on the core truth of the message. They could have recognized the challenges ahead and could have thought constructively about how to overcome them. We too can sift through the messages that we hear in order to acknowledge those kernels of truth. We can then acknowledge the issues of our day and think constructively about how to solve them.

This election season, may we heed the core truth in the messages we hear. May we respond rather than react. And may we work constructively toward bettering our world.

On Shabbat afternoons I often indulge myself by stretching out with a novel for a couple of hours, lost in someone else's imagination. Recently, Israeli author David Grossman transported me to Jerusalem of the 1930s and 1960s in "Duel" and of contemporary days in "Someone to Run With." While the first is a children's book about a twelve-year old and a seventy-year old and the second is about two teenagers and a dog, the books share themes of quests for friendship, mysteries to be resolved, and growth toward and through adulthood. While not focused on Jerusalem, the city is present through the many different kinds of people who sleuth, shop, cook, chase, wait, sing, immigrate, threaten, paint, console, and play through the tales. The translations from the Hebrew flow in such color, I forgot I wasn't reading the original. Here's to libraries, public and congregational.

No, my bulletin message isn't about to become a monthly book review. I sat down to write on the state of OZS's budget now that we've closed the books for the last fiscal year. But closing the covers of novels seemed a much more attractive topic than closing financial accounts. So my mind wandered. Back to the budget. The good news is that last year we succeeded in returning to a balanced budget. This has meant that we're a little warmer indoors in the summer and cooler in the winter and that the bulletin now arrives to most of us electronically instead of printed. Debbie Griswold has been remarkable at finding ways to reduce office and building expenses. And you, our members, have come through from your hearts to provide the financial means to provide for salaries, utility bills, building upkeep, insurance, noshes, school books, and that weekly sip of Mogen David wine. This current year's budget is again a conservative one, mindful of our economic times. At the same time, we aim to support the growing array of activities and people that make OZS. The Yom Kippur Appeal showed that as a congregation we understand this. Now we can repair the fire alarm (not a choice), spruce up the bathrooms (a delayed renovation), and properly repair the piano for this month's performance by Israeli-born pianist Inon Barnatan. Thank you!

The program is very simple. Purchase a starter gift card from OZS for \$5 (the card has \$5 loaded onto it). When you check out at Kroger, ask the cashier first to put however much money you want onto your gift card (\$25, \$50, etc.). You can put money onto your gift card with cash, credit card or check. Now that you have money on your gift card, check out as you normally do but pay for your items with the gift card! Use your Plus Card as usual.

For every dollar you load onto your gift card, Ohavay Zion gets 4%!

When you run out of money on your gift card, simply put more money on it again. They're reusable! You can put money onto your card at any Kroger cash register, or at the customer service center. Remember that once you put money onto your gift card, it's like cash. So don't lose it!

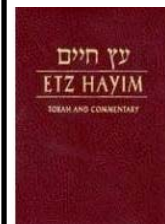
