FROM THE RABBI

Question: If you had lived during the Holocaust, how might you have maintained hope?

Answer: Thank you for your question.

It is difficult for me to say how I might have maintained hope because I can never be sure of how I might have truly responded in such a horrific situation. Nevertheless, I will try to present some Jewish ideas that may have offered hope in that indescribable darkness.

In Genesis 15, God shows Abraham a haunting vision of his offspring enslaved in Egypt. A “great dark dread” falls upon Abraham when he becomes aware of tremendous suffering that is to come, yet God assures him that in spite of the suffering, his descendants will ultimately go free.

The Exodus from Egypt has always been the Jewish archetype for moving from bondage and suffering to liberation and joy. From the redemption from Egypt, we envision the world’s ultimate redemption.

While the celebration of Passover, with its focus on the liberation from Egypt, is a prime focus for Jewish observance today, we pray that in the future we will be able to celebrate the ultimate redemption. As Jeremiah 16 states, “Assuredly, a time is coming—declares the Lord—when it shall no more be said, ‘As the Lord lives who brought the Israelites out of the land of Egypt,’ but rather, ‘As the Lord lives who brought the Israelites out of the northland, and out of all of the lands to which they were banished.’”

This hope in the ultimate redemption is essential in Judaism, and this is why according to the Talmud (Shabbat 31a), one of the questions we will be asked when we die is: Did you await the redemption?

And yet in spite of the vast Jewish literature that calls us to maintain hope in future, if I had been there, would I have actually maintained hope? Would I have been able to maintain my faith in humanity’s redemption amidst what certainly may have appeared to be humanity’s ultimate descent into the abyss?

The Talmud (Sotah 12a) describes how Amram, the father of Moses and a person of incredible faith and integrity, lost his faith in the future. How, he questioned, could he possibly bring additional children into a world in which they would likely just be killed by Pharaoh?

Amram’s position was certainly reasonable. Anyone would be justified for having that position in such a situation. Yet Miriam, Amram’s daughter, challenged her father on this point. She argued that in spite of what happens, we must continue to bring whatever good we can into this world, and who knows, the redemption may be just about to occur.

Amram heeded his daughter’s sage advice, resumed his spousal relationship his wife Yocheved, and soon after, Moshe was born.

In a situation like the Shoah it would be completely reasonable to feel that the world is beyond hope, yet Judaism asks us to hold on to the promise, HaTikvah – the hope that things will get better.

Life can be difficult, perhaps unimaginably harsh. But Judaism trusts that ultimately things will get better. In Jeremiah 30:7, the prophet envisions an unspeakable time for our people, but also foresees that we will not be destroyed, that our hope is not lost: “Oh what a terrible time. None is like it. It is a time of trouble for Jacob. Yet he will be redeemed.”

It would be natural to lose faith during the Shoah, and none should be questioned for a loss of faith in such an unspeakable situation. Yet there were those who somehow were able to maintain faith in the redemption. There were those who in spite of everything, were able to sing, “Ani Maamin – I believe with complete faith in the coming of the Messiah, and though he tarries, in spite of it all, each day I await his coming.”

MONTHLY THOUGHTS FROM THE RELIGIOUS COMMITTEE

Time to Get Up! Jewish Morning Rituals and Prayers, part 7

In the last few columns, I have been discussing the Birkot ha-shachar, the morning blessings, a series of fourteen short prayers said every morning, all beginning with *Barukh atah Adonai eloheinu melekh ha-olam* (Blessed are you Adonai, our God, sovereign of time and space). As I wrote last month, most of these blessings are coordinated with the process of waking up and getting ready for the day, although they also have a more general meaning of giving thanks to God for the world we live in.

Last time we looked at the first four blessings in the main sequence, regarding opening the eyes, dressing, sitting up straight, and standing. The final six complete the process (all of this following the explanation of the Talmud in Berachot 60b):

Upon descending from one's bed to the ground, one should recite: Blessed...Who spreads the earth above the waters (*roka ha-aretz al ha-mayim*), in thanksgiving for the creation of solid ground upon which to walk.

Upon walking, one should recite: Blessed...Who steadies our steps (*ha-meikhin mitzadei gaver*).

Upon putting on shoes, one should recite: Blessed...Who has provided me with all I need (*she-asah li kol tzorki*), as shoes are a basic necessity.

Upon putting on a belt, one should recite: Blessed...Who girds Israel with strength (*ozet yisrael bigvurah*).

Upon spreading the tallit upon the head [before putting it on the shoulders], one should recite: Blessed... Who crowns Israel with glory (*oter yisrael b'tifarah*).

The final blessing in the series is not found in the Talmud's list, but its meaning is clear, as this one, in a way, sums up the whole process:

Blessed are You, Adonai, our God, sovereign of time and space, Who gives strength to the weary (*ha-noten laya-eif ko-ach*).
