FROM THE RABBI

Question: How would you respond to the murder of Mireille Knoll?

Answer: Mireille Knoll was a kind and loving individual, a grandmother of 85 years-old, and a survivor of the Shoah. On Friday, March 23rd, she was tragically murdered, stabbed to death in her own apartment in Paris, France, in a brutal anti-Jewish act.

Why do we have such acts in our world, today, in 5778?

It has been 3,330 years since the Exodus in 2448. 3,330 years since our people were liberated “from the land of Egypt, from the house of bondage”. (Exodus 20:2, etc.)

We were asked to be a “kingdom of priests and a holy nation” (Exodus 19:6), and to fulfill that role, we were required to be a “nation that dwells apart” (Numbers 23:9).

Again and again, God reminded us that we had been “strangers, foreigners, aliens in the land of Egypt” (Exodus 22:21; 23:9, Leviticus 19:34, Deuteronomy 10:19)

And for most of our history, we have continued to hold that role of strangers, foreigners, aliens, set apart by our faith.

In the ancient world, we were unusual. Rather than worshiping the gods, we worshiped God alone. We were seen as lazy misanthropes. Lazy because one seventh of our days we refrained from work, and misanthropes because we kept ourselves separate from our neighbors.

In the Christian and Muslim worlds, we continued to remain separate, faithful to our God and our traditions. Why would we not simply accept their loving message? Why would we not simply submit? For those who gave in, for those who became Christians or Muslims, anti-Jewish hatred would often (though not always) dissipate. Those who remained true to our faith and the faith of our ancestors, paid a heavy price.

In the Shoah, it did not matter how we acted or what we believed. The Nazis took all the anti-Judaism bequeathed to them and molded it into a hatred of Jews that went beyond all concerns of faith in God or adherence to the Torah.

With such a history, it could be tempting to despair and hide. It could be tempting to simply assimilate. Those who have, and their descendants, are no longer with us. They are no longer Jews.

For those of us who choose to remain Jewish, we must remember that we are not alone. In spite of the hatred, there are many who stand with us.

As the Times of Israel reported: At the vigil for Mireille Knoll, a Muslim man quietly entered the synagogue and sat in the back row. It was Lassana Baithily, the man who had saved a dozen people during an attack at a kosher store in 2015. After the vigil, many people hugged Baithily and shook his hand. They addressed him with the familiar “tu” rather than the formal “vous,” and they said his presence at the vigil gave them hope.

There is hatred, but there is also love. And just as others have stood up for us, we must stand up for others. We know how it feels to be an outsider. We know the heart of the stranger, for we were strangers in the land of Egypt. (Exodus 23:9) And we know the heart of one who has been hated, for we have been hated.

We are called to be a light unto the nations (Isaiah 49:6). We must stand up both for ourselves and for others, and we must let our light shine, calling for love: Love for our neighbor (Leviticus 19:18) and love for the stranger (Deuteronomy 10:19).

In spite of the tragedy of Mireille Knoll’s death, we must not forget Mireille Knoll’s life: a life embodying the ideals of love prescribed in the Torah, a life of kindness toward her fellow whomever they might be. May God give us the strength and the courage to live a Jewish life, where we are a blessing to our world. (Genesis 12:2)

SAFETY AND SECURITY AT OZS

All religious and educational organizations, Ohavay Zion included, must take seriously matters of safety and security. We must be concerned about natural threats, such as tornados, and potential human threats, to both our people and our facilities. While we are aware of no particular threat of any kind at this moment, the Board has been working to enhance security and safety at OZS.

In cooperation with both local and federal authorities, we have been studying a wide range of security-related issues, and a select committee is moving ahead with proposals for upgrading our facilities. It is likely that access to the building will be the first item to reach the Board for discussion and implementation, with other steps to follow.

At the same time as facility upgrades are being considered, we are moving ahead in some other areas. One of the most important steps we can take, both for security and to help us be even more welcoming, is to implement a program of having a trained USHER for services every Saturday morning and at other appropriate times.

Therefore, we are looking for volunteers to make up a SECURITY TEAM. Each member, following a brief training session (those of you who serve as High Holiday ushers already know what is involved), would be asked to serve as an usher a few times a year (the more volunteers, the fewer times each would be needed). MONTHLY THOUGHTS FROM THE RELIGIOUS COMMITTEE

Time to Get Up! Jewish Morning Rituals and Prayers, part 8

The conclusion of the Birkot ha-shachar, the morning blessings, following the series of fourteen short prayers discussed in recent columns, is quite different from the others, all of which were connected with the physical process of waking up and getting dressed (although they also carried a spiritual meaning). The opening sentence of the blessing, beginning with the usual *Baruch atah*, seems to return to the subject of waking up: “who removes sleep from my eyes and slumber from my eyelids” (*ha-ma'avir sheyna mey-eyney u-t'numah mey-afapai*) (a parallel to a nighttime blessing that praises God who “casts the bands of sleep on my eyes and slumber on my eyelids”).

The continuation of the blessing, however, as explained by Rav Ezra Bick of Yeshivat Har Etzion, makes it clear that something else is involved, since we have already thanked God for our physical reawakening. This is a paragraph asking God help us prepare for life in the world: to bring us to Torah and the mitzvot, to help us avoid error and sin, to help us not submit to the evil inclination, and to avoid those who would do evil, but instead to act with goodness and desire to serve God. While the prayer seems to ask God to impose these choices, thus eliminating our free will, it is better interpreted as asking God to help us do that on our own.

As Rav Bick summarize the prayer, alluding to the idea that awaking from sleep is a kind of resurrection, “You have restored me to life for the purpose of sending me out into the world, to fulfill the task You assigned to me. Please help me fulfill that task, to be engaged in Your Torah and fulfill Your commandments, and, especially, **not** to fail the task by succumbing to the evil inclination. We aren't **thanking** God for life restored; we are accepting the mission implied by life restored, and immediately asking for assistance in fulfilling that difficult mission.”

The prayer concludes by asking God to show us kindness, love, and compassion, and with a final praise: “*Baruch atah Adonai*, who acts with kindly love to the people Israel.”
