FROM THE RABBI

Our holy texts can contain powerful and emotional messages for our present day. One great example is the quote of Psalm 51:20, which is stitched onto one of our beautiful Torah covers (please see the previous months' articles, which celebrate our recently completed Torah covers).

The Hebrew text on the Torah contains the first part of the verse: *Heitiva Virtzoncha Et Tzion* – By Your will, cause Zion to be good.

After centuries of persecution and oppression, the creation of *Medinat Yisrael*, the country of Israel, was nothing short of a miracle. Perhaps even more of a miracle was the fact that in the face of five armies striving to “push the Jews into the sea,” Israel not only survived, but continued to grow and blossom.

Apart from the plethora of biblical verses envisioning a return to Zion, Israel must exist. It is our home. It is also our life raft, and has saved numerous Jews around the globe. With the recent increase in antisemitic activity, both in Europe and in the United States, Israel is vital. Perhaps that is why the end of the verse from Psalm 51:20 states: *Tivne Chomot Yerushalayim* – You [God] should build the walls of Jerusalem.

Yet, what is the first part of the verse saying? What does ‘*Heitiva Virtzoncha Et Tzion* – By your will, cause Tzion to be good’ mean?

On the one hand, we may be saying that God should make things good for Zion. In this sense, the full verse wishes for blessing within Zion and walls to protect that blessing.

On the other hand, the verse speaks of causing Zion to be good. Zion is supposed to be a role model of excellent behavior. Our texts speak about the nations of the world coming to Zion to learn Torah, and so Zion is meant to shine as a beacon of justice and righteousness in our world.

As such, I join with AIPAC, the ADL, the AJC, the Rabbinical Assembly, USCJ, URJ, and the many people and parties in Israel itself in condemning the recent move of Prime Minister Netanyahu to bring Otzma Yehudit into the Knesset. Otzma Yehudit is a party which is founded on and continues the ways of the dangerous and racist R. Meir Kahane. In 1985, the Knesset excluded Kahanists from national politics with the creation of a law that blocked racist parties from joining the government, and in 1994, the Israeli government officially classified the Kahanist factions as terrorist groups.

The inclusion of Otzma Yehudit, as a way of forming a bigger coalition for the upcoming Israeli elections on Tuesday, April 9, 2019, is nothing short of a *Shanda*. Rather than being the beacon of light envisioned by our prophets, the inclusion of Otzma Yehudit goes against our highest values of dignity of every person, that each human being is created in the image of God and must be respected as such.

Heitiva Virtzoncha Et Tzion - By Your will, cause Zion to be good! May Israel always be protected and prosper. And may Israel be good, an exemplar of ethics and holiness in our world

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As many of you know, Beth and I have just returned from two months in Venice, where we were conducting research as part of my sabbatical leave. I worked in the archives and libraries five days a week, but from Friday evening through all day Saturday, I spent most of my time with the local Jewish community, which is in some ways quite similar to ours, and in others quite different.

While the Venetian community is now about the same size as OZS, about 400 individuals, it is much older, dating from at least 1516, when the original Ghetto was created. However, OZS is about as large as it has ever been, while there were once more than 5,000 Jews in Venice. Their synagogues are also just a bit older—the one used in the Winter was founded in 1541, and the new one used in the Summer in 1580 (the current buildings of both are from the seventeenth century)

Although the Venice community is Orthodox, in the Italian Sephardic tradition, today the range of observance is quite similar to OZS, with a portion quite observant, but the majority less so (often much less so).

As an Orthodox congregation, services are more frequent (daily morning minyan, Shabbat mincha and havdalah, for example). On the other hand, they are less participatory than at OZS (although in recent years this has been changing), and are, of course, not egalitarian (I have spent much effort in persuading my friends there that Conservative Judaism is in many ways not that much different, except for the egalitarian bit, from what they know). Like OZS, services are sometimes led by members of the community, but, since they do the entire weekly portion, the Torah is read almost exclusively by the Chief Rabbi or his assistant.

We have gotten used to welcoming many visitors at OZS, but that is nothing like in Venice, where tourists almost always outnumber residents, sometimes by huge margins. We have, in general, better kiddush lunches and are more welcoming.

As a lover of ritual and tradition, I always enjoy spending time with the Venice community, but I always miss the warmth and *ruach* of OZS. It's good to be back!

MONTHLY THOUGHTS FROM THE RELIGIOUS COMMITTEE

100 Blessings a Day: Food part 6

Over the past few months, we have looked at the different blessings that apply to food. Before moving to other types of blessings, we need to take a quick look at how to put those blessings into practice when eating more than one type of food. What follows is greatly simplified; for more details, see <https://www.aish.com/jl/jewish-law/blessings/?s=bc>

Some cases are quite straightforward:

If you are eating a meal with bread, the blessing for the bread (*ha-motzi*) covers the entire meal. Otherwise, a separate blessing is needed for each type of food.

If you are presented with a series of foods, you say the blessing for each as it is presented. As long as you have the intention of continuing to eat, you don't need to repeat the blessing for a second food of the same type (so, if you said *ha-eitz* on an apple, and then you are brought grapes, you don't need to say another blessing).

After that, it gets more complicated:

If you are presented with many foods at once, but without bread, for instance, at a buffet, you should generally first say a blessing over a grain product, such as crackers (*mezonot*), then over wine (*ha-gafen*), then over fruits or vegetables (*ha-eitz* or *ha-adamah*), and finally over anything else (*she'hakol*)

If you there are two foods that require the same blessing, there are several factors to consider, in the following order: 1) if one is among the seven species named in the Torah as characteristic of Israel (wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olive oil, and dates), start with that; 2) something that is whole has precedence over something in pieces; 3) if those don't decide the order, say the blessing over the one you prefer, or at least desire more at that moment; and 4) if you desire both equally, choose the one that is larger. In any case, once you have said the blessing, other foods of the same type are covered.

If a product is made of more than one type of food, the one that is most important or makes up the majority, is the one that gets the blessing (for example, eating strawberry yoghurt, you say *she'hakol* for the yoghurt, not *ha-adama* for the strawberries).
