

Rabbi's Message

Dear OZS Community Members,

The Hebrew month of Elul is coming to a close, and in just one week, we will be celebrating Rosh Hashanah. We have spent this last month engaged in the process of *Teshuvah*, repentance, self-reflection, introspection, and growth. We have spent the last month taking stock of our inner lives and our shortcomings. And soon, we will arrive at the High Holidays with a sense of purpose and spiritual alignment.

As part of my *Teshuvah* process this year, I have been thinking a lot about our High Holiday services, and the season in general. I have been thinking about what to prioritize in this moment of great conflict. *Are we really going to do virtual High Holidays for a second year in a row? How are we going to keep everybody safe?* I have been thinking about the spiritual health and well-being of our community, and I have been thinking about responding responsibly to the data before us.

This process of introspection led myself and the members of the Religious and Reopening committees to make the most difficult decision. A decision that we were all hoping to avoid. But, I am confident that the decision to have our High Holiday services available via livestream is the right decision. It is the safe, responsible decision. And being virtual in the short-term, will hopefully allow us to return to the sanctuary and the synagogue more fully in the months ahead.

I know that our *tefilah* experience will not be the same, that our davening may suffer if done virtually. But I do want to encourage you all to participate as best you can, even if from a distance. We are hopeful that we will be able to provide several opportunities throughout the month of September to safely gather in small groups, to capture at least some small feeling of togetherness during the High Holiday season.

I want to share a quote from my teacher Rav Aviva Richman. She writes:

"If we are insistent enough— if we show up, even when alone, even when uninspired— it will pave the way for nothing less than divine prayer."

Please be insistent this High Holiday season. Push yourself to pray, push yourself to participate and connect, push yourself to have the most full experience possible.

Please keep an eye out for announcements about in-person opportunities, Tashlich service sign-ups, and more.

Sending my brachot for a High Holiday season full of insistence and divine prayer.

President's Message

Having to deliver my first formal message to the congregation via Zoom was not what I wanted, or even expected. And some of what I had to share was not what I wanted to be sharing. For the second year in a row, we will NOT be having in-person services for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. All services will be STREAMED. The decision was not an easy one and it BREAKS MY HEART. This is the time of year when we usually get to see people: family, friends and other members of OZS that we don't always see at weekly services. It's the time of year for celebration and sharing our Jewish heritage with our entire congregational family. We put aside our differences, politics, and we get to hug each other and catch up. I was hoping that our new Rabbi would be able to experience Ohavay Zion at its fullest, literally, and feel and see in-person what a spectacular pulpit she has chosen.

The decision to not hold in-person services was not an easy one. And, it did not happen without a lot of input from many members, the Rabbi, the Executive Board, the trustees, the Religious and Opening Committees, as well as many other individuals that shared their thoughts. Besides the obvious required masking, we considered proof of vaccination, prior negative testing, offering smaller services to reduce the number of people and we even considered a lottery. But, the bottom line is that keeping our congregants safe is of utmost importance and all these options, besides being a logistical nightmare, still had too many risks as the local situation worsened.

However, as we look forward to better times, let's not forget the good stuff still going on. We have a wonderful new Rabbi and if you have not yet had an opportunity to meet with her via zoom or in-person, reach out to her.

We have ordered a replacement for our current *Siddur Hadash, Lev Shalem*. It was recommended by Rabbi Abramowitz and completely and enthusiastically supported by the Religious Committee and the Board. It offers clear and more complete transliterations. It provides an explanation of insights into the services. It even tells us when to stand and when to sit. And, at a time when we want to be socially, politically and culturally correct, it provides gender inclusive language. It has excellent English readings and additional readings for davening leaders. It's also available online as a PDF and it includes weekday, Shabbat and holiday services. Although the siddurim have been paid for through a combination of the Sara Levy Fund, the budget, and a few anonymous donors, we will be offering congregants the opportunity to memorialize a loved one with a donation and an inscription in one of the prayer books. More information about this will follow after the holidays.

We have, of course, continued with the upkeep of the building and its grounds, including the maintenance of several plumbing and roofing issues. And, the Board has, once again, NOT increased dues.

I would like to especially thank those who have gone above and beyond to help me as I transition into my new role as President, and those who have and continue to carry us through these incredibly challenging times. The Board of Directors continues to provide great leadership and the committees keep our programming and services running.

The Executive Board: Ira and Debbie have been awesome. I can't thank them enough for their support. Debbie, our treasurer, has put in countless hours to ensure we are both fiscally solvent and functioning as a Synagogue. We are IN good shape. Our first Vice President, Mark Klar, looks after our physical structure, and spends hours doing behind the scenes maintenance and repair. Scooter Stein, our Second VP has helped to train new members of the Executive Board and has helped to spearhead the reformation of the Social Action Committee. And our newest member of the Executive Board, Eli Crane, has stepped up to take on the role of Ohavay Zion Secretary bringing with him fresh ideas and a sound voice. And of course Ira Cooper, our beloved past president, has been invaluable the past few months encouraging me and helping me find my way. Since standing for an applause isn't an option, just knowing how much I appreciate you will have to do.

A bit of a heads up—sometime in the hopefully not so far off future, we will be hosting a more complete Rabbinical Installation to celebrate Rabbi Abramowitz's first and best pulpit ever. We look forward to many years of her spiritual leadership, and we want to welcome her and Joseph to our OZS family by doing it up right. Details will follow once we get a better handle on things.

Make sure you check out holiday details in emails and the bulletin. And let us hope that next year we can be together and have a once again in-person congregational dinner, like in the old days. I look forward to providing the bourbon for a l'chaim.

OZS Social Action Committee Combatting Violence in Central Kentucky

The restoration of social action work from our congregation has been a priority for the new OZS Board. Over the past couple of months there have been multiple discussions into reinvigorating the Social Action Committee as an active part of the congregation. From these discussions has grown the idea that action can be done at the local level to make an impact in Central Kentucky. Projects undertaken will not only expand Synagogue relationships within our community at large, but will provide a backdrop for our OZS community to learn and grow together through knowledge, understanding and action.

At the August board meeting, a board member proposed the idea of providing funding that will help complete the mural to the late anti-violence activist Anita Franklin. Ms. Franklin dedicated her final years to ending violence in our community after losing a son to gun violence in Duncan Park in 2014. Her example has brought together people from all over the community and has made an impact at the local, state, and national levels. The Board was strongly in agreement to contribute \$500 to this unique project that will create a lasting impact in Lexington's East End.

In recent years social action at OZS has sought to focus on a single topic to be explored. A suggestion to focus on violence in our community and who it impacts was agreed upon by multiple individuals. Board member Scooter Stein committed to overseeing programming throughout the year that will bring various perspectives around the issue to congregants who want to learn more.

We invite you to join us as we work to build a stronger community. All are invited to participate and help shape this expanding movement. Details will come surrounding future events, and we look forward to building with you.

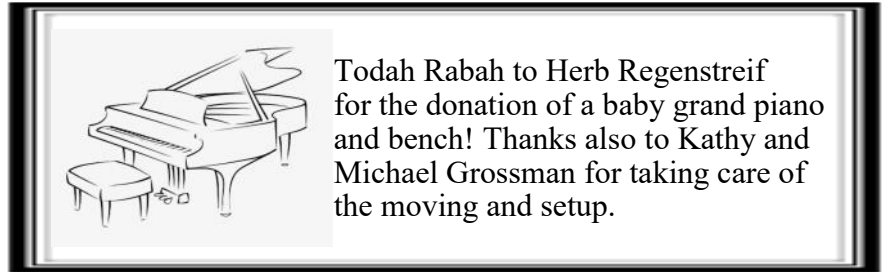

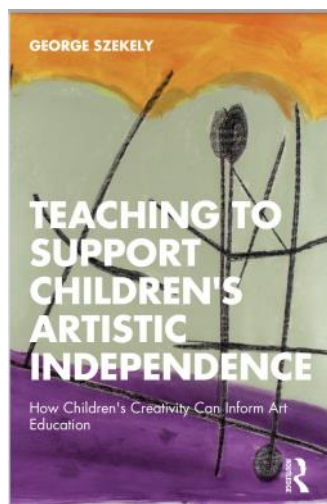
